It is this magazine article and the related publications of Harvard professor Samuel P. Huntington that have ignited a growing debate about his premise that Hispanics, particularly, Mexican Ameri-

cans, pose a threat to the United States.


Professor Huntington goes a step further by suggesting that not only do Mexican Americans pose a threat to the United States but that the US is ignoring this threat much to its own peril. Below is a taste of **Huntington:**

It is my hypothesis that the fundamental source of conflict in this new world will not be primarily ideological or primarily economic. The great divisions among humankind and the dominating source of conflict will be cultural. Nation states will remain the most powerful actors in world affairs, but the principal conflicts of global politics will occur between nations and groups of different civilizations. During the cold war the world was divided into the First, Second and Third Worlds. Those divisions are no longer relevant. It is far more meaningful now to group countries not in terms of their political or economic systems or in terms of their level of economic development but rather in terms of their culture and civilization.

Already, a number of people have taken issue with **Huntington** and have written challenges to his arguments. No mater where one stands in this argument, this unfolding debate is without question one Page # 6

Applications Invited for Soros Fellowships for New Americans

Deadline: November 1, 2004

The **Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowships for New Americans** (http://pdsoros.org/) is an annual fellowship program designed to provide opportunities for new Americans to achieve leadership positions in their chosen fields.

For the purposes of this program, a "new American" is an individual who (1) is a resident alien, i.e., holds a Green Card; or (2) has been naturalized as a U.S. citizen; or (3) is the child of two parents who are both naturalized citizens.

The fellowships provide grants for up to two years of graduate study in the United States. The fellow receives an annual maintenance grant of \$20,000 and a tuition grant of one-half the tuition cost of the U.S. graduate program attended by the fellow. Thirty fellowships will be awarded each year.

A fellow may pursue a graduate degree in any professional field (e.g., engineering, medicine, law, social work, etc.) or scholarly discipline in the arts, humanities, social sciences, and sciences.

The applicant must either have a bachelor's degree or be in her/his final year of undergraduate study. Those who have a bachelor's degree may already be pursuing graduate study and may receive fellowship support to continue that study. Individuals who are in the third, or subsequent, year of study in the same graduate program are not eligible for the competition.

LUPE, La Union del Pueblo Entero, has 3 service offices in Hidalgo County, Texas—in San Juan, in Pharr, and in Mission. In Texas, call 956 787-2233 or write to them at P.O. Box 188, San Juan, Texas 78589. Offices are also located in Phoenix, Arizona, and in Sunnyside, Washington.

Any individual who becomes a member of LUPE, receives a number of services, including Income Tax preparation, immigration services, notary public services, translations and other help in recovering unpaid wages, calls to social security, workers compensation and referral to our list of good attorneys, good doctors, and the LUPE center also provide work for those doing community service hours.

Any one can be a member of LUPE. When a person pays LUPE dues of \$40 for an individual, and \$60 for a husband/ wife, you become a member for one year. If you are near one of the offices you receive access to services at a very reasonable rate.

LUPE has thousands of members who participate, direct campaigns for community projects to better the colonias, participate in leadership training, and continue with the vision to develop a Farm Worker movement. Together the members organize to renew the hope and respect for all people.

The Questions we ask are:

Who is going to change your situation?

How many promises have been made to you?

Who is going to protect your rights?

Who is going to better your conditions in your community or colonia?

Who is going to better the education of your children?

The answer is: Who else but all of us organized together working together.

As a LUPE member, you also receive access to services that the AFL CIO provides, called Union Privilege. One example is Unionsecure. Unionsecure is a service that offers you life, accident and supplemental health insurance needs, which pays \$5,000 for a motor vehicle death, and \$1000 for accidental death insurance, other than motor vehicle.

There are many other kinds of Union Privilege services.

In addition, the Union offers access to IMSS (Instituto Mexicano del Seguro Social). IMSS is the Universal Health Plan offered in Mexico. The UFW has access to that plan for any member or their family who lives in Mexico. Services offered at IMSS locations in Mexico include: doctors visits, lab work, x ray, medicine, visits with specialists, dental plan; hospitalization, and others. It covers individuals and families. The annual insurance fee is based on the member's age.

The United Farm Workers, AFL CIO, is working to re integrate, re connect, working people into the democratic process. In the last 20 years, as more and more of us have registered to vote, fewer and fewer of us are voting. For example:

• In the 2002 Governor's election, with 250,000 registered voters in Hidalgo County, only 70,000 persons voted, or 28%. 180,000 voters chose not to vote even in this very heated election between Governor Rick Perry and Tony Sanchez.

• In the 2004 school board elections, in PSJA only 5200 persons voted out of a pool of 44,500, or 11.6%.

• Only 2600 voted in the Donna school board, out of a pool of 13,500, 19.3%.

Our public officials are being elected by a small minority of the voting population, and an even smaller percentage of the total number residents in this county. As I have analyzed voting patterns, the majority of registered voters are "inconsistent voters" -those who never vote. In all probabilities, our UFW members are in this list of inconsistent voters. We have registered them in great numbers, and we have endorsed the candidates. And then the system has broken down.

We believe there are two problems we have to overcome. (1.) People do not know who to vote for. (2.) And they do not know how to vote. My anecdotal surveys have found that when I ask our members why they don't vote, they say this:

- 'We don't know who to vote for"
- 'We don't know how to vote'
- 'We don't know how to use the machine"

Candidates do create name ID by yard signs, bumper stickers, use of tv ads. The newspapers carry greater details on the differences between candidates. But in the RGValley there is no Spanish language newspaper coverage. Detailed information on candidates has not reached the inconsistent voter.

In a training workshop early this year, I passed around sample ballots and instructed voters that to indicate their vote on this ballot they must fill in the circle in front of the name of their candidate of choice. Many of the ballots in this exercise were returned with crosses through the circle, with check marks through the circle. These ballots will not be counted.

In other training sessions on how to use the machines, we have seen voters return the palanca to the upright position, thus wiping out their vote. Our plan is very simple and is based on the kind of organizing that the UFW is known for, the house meeting campaign. Meetings are hosted by our members who invite 10 relatives or neighbors, and thus a committee begins to be formed.

State of Texas Economic Report Card

New Study Provides Comparative Benchmarking across all 50 States on Measures Related to Economic Performance, Business Vitality and Development Capacity

Despite more than a year of heralded economic recovery, many American families are still struggling financially, according to the Washington D.C. based Corporation for Economic Development's 17th Annual Development Report Card for the States.

The State of Texas received a mixed report card . . .

The State of Texas received a mixed report card in the study

and provided a several unexpected surprises. The box on the right contains the grades for **Texas** in three categories.

The Development Report Card for the States (which can be found online at drc.cfed.org) uses 68 measures to provide a relative, stateby-state assessment of economic development in three main areas: Performance, Business Vitality, and Development Capacity.

Performance is about how well the state's economy is

As can be seen in the State of Texas Report Card, the Performance Measure came in with an "F." In the study, Performance is how well is the state's economy providing opportunities for employment, income, and an improving quality of life.

With respect to Business Vitality, the capture of this measures centers on how dynamic are the state's small and large businesses. Sub measures such as competitiveness, Initial Public Offerings and job growth are examined. In this category, Texas made an "A."

The third category, Development Capacity, looks at what is the state's capacity for future development. The sub-indices in this category include, human resources, financial resources and infrastructure resources such as roads, sewage treatment needs and electricity generation.

Why doesn't the Report Card just have one grade for each state?

Each of the indexes used to create the report card are like the subjects that one might find on a school report card. If they were added together, they would loose their meaning. It is like a student who is good in English but not in Math. Giving him one grade to for all his school work would not reveal what is going on in each subject area. Tony Sanchez Political Pioneer? Chale!

The only pioneering Tony Sanchez did was spent over \$10 million dollars of his own money on his failed campaign for the Texas Govenorship in 2002.

The San Antonio Express-News writer who argues that Sanchez is a political pioneer is careful with his words, ". . his status as the first Hispanic gubenatorial nominee from a major political party has opened the door a little wider for young, up and coming Democrats."

You don't need to be a political locksmith to know that the door to political opportunity in Texas has been open for many years.

One only need recall the many campaigns of Henry B. Gonzalez beginning with his 1956 run for Texas Governor. In the 1970s, it was La Raza Unida Party and Ramsey Muñiz run for the Texas Governorship in 1972, that almost cost, Dolph Briscoe, Jr. the election. Muñiz polled over 200,000 votes under the banner of La Raza Unida.

And then there is Victor Morales who won the Democratic nomination for Senator in 1996. Continuing with his criticism, **Cosby** stated, "You should have thought more of yourself when you were in high school, when you had an opportunity."

These and other remarks were initially delivered in May at the **Rainbow/PUSH Coalition and Citizenship Conference** in **Chicago**. Then over the last two weeks, at other functions including television shows, he has continued to question the priorities of lower black Americans.


Bill Cosby's Comments Make Minority Leaders Nervous

Reaction to his words has been mixed Some people are offended because they believe Bill Cosby is blaming poor people for some of their own problems. Others are saying that it is about time somebody stood up and told the truth that it is about time that poor people took more responsibility for the things that are going on in their lives.

Among the other points **Bill Cosby** has been making is that poor people have not kept their part of the bargain when it comes to civil rights issues. **Cosby** said that members of the black community have not done all they could or should when it comes to continuing the fight for equal rights.

This last point is particularly interesting when one examines the Hispanic community asks the same question about parenting priorities. But it can get a bit more complicated in that among poor Hispanics, one must include recent immigrants. This discussion will continue to be sure.

New Book on Willie Velasquez



The new book on the Life and Times of Willie Velasquez deserves a spot on your bookshelf. This long awaited work by **Juan Sepulveda**, author and friend of **Willie** for many years, manages to captures the man and his spirit at many levels. In the book we learn of Willie the dreamer, Willie the pragmatist, Willie the Highspanic and Willie the Chicano. We also learn of the tremendous personal economic pain that **Willie Velasquez** and his family suffered as *El Movimiento* many times took a front seat in the Velasquez household.

The book is also very good in reconstructing the behind the scenes action in the offices of the **Southwest Voter Registra-tion and Education Project** that **Velasquez** started in 1974. Many of us had no idea of all the anguish and turmoil that went into building that organization over the years. **Juan's** reconstruction of the events provides a good peek into the decision making and thinking that resulted in the large increase of registered voters in the Hispanic community over the years.

While the book is a great addition to the literature on the Chicano Movement, it could have been made even better with the voices of **Armando Villarreal**, a long time employee of SVREP, **Bill Calderon**, another committed individual who put in time with the SVREP. I would have even liked to hear Lisa Hernandez's views of how exactly the Houston operation went down in the 1980s. But absent these suggestions, I highly recommend this book to anyone who wants to learn about a man who truly gave of himself because he believed in the mission. Good job Juan!
